October was another busy month for all the children and staff at Weldon CE Primary.

October also saw our first parents' evening of this academic year, where parents, carers and children are invited into school to not only look at some of the fantastic work the children have been producing, but to meet with the teachers to discuss the children's progress. We also had the photographer in school to take individual pictures of the children, many of which will be appearing on mantelpieces across the parish in the coming weeks.

The Coram Life Education & SCARF team visited school at the start of October. The children's charity Coram Life Education provides Health and Wellbeing Education support to schools, delivering fun, interactive and age-appropriate workshops to help children to understand the importance of physical and emotional health. All children were very excited to take part in these sessions with their classmates and we're already looking forward to the next visit.
