

Councillor's Corner

Meet Colin Shepard

Parish Maintenance Committee Chair

I was born and went to school in Northampton. After training to be a teacher at Loughborough, I took up a teaching post in Corby. I later moved to Weldon in 1971 soon after I married.

I have two sons and four grandchildren. My eldest son is a Chartered Civil Engineer whilst my younger son works in Motor Racing and lives in the United States.

As a teacher I rose to become Head of Design Studies at a local comprehensive as well as running an Adult Education Centre. With the introduction of the Education Reform Act 1988 and Local Management of Schools, I was made redundant as a teacher, along with many other teachers.

Through a fellow contract bridge player I moved into the employment world of Financial Services. I eventually became an Independent Financial Adviser and along with two other partners running our own business based in Wellingborough.


Let's help our garden grow with pre-spring cleaning!

Clean your pathways, clear dead leaves and branches and compost all organic matter where possible, turning the compost pile would be beneficial at this point.

If you have too much compost, offer it to a fellow gardener who would appreciate the extra matter.

Clear garden debris, as it can harbour diseases and infect your plants.

Spring is a good time to rake and feed the lawn, reseed bare patches for lush growth going into summer.



warmth of greenhouses or windowsills, allowing early seeds to be sown for planting out later.

After the last of the frosts, repotting and pruning can be carried out. Do your research first to identify plants that need spring pruning to prolong plant health.

Raking the soil improves airflow and a chance to pull out weeds as you go. Add some new topsoil in preparation for spring planting.

> A garden journal is a good way to track your spring jobs and planting.

Remember - Always clean your tools, so they are free of bacteria and germs. You don't want to undo all your hard work!





SAFER COMMUNITIES

Since restarting the Parish walkabouts last year, the councillors have covered Weldon Village, Weldon Park and this January Priors Hall Park.



It is a useful opportunity to view matters that you have raised and to meet you. Your Parish Council is working hard to make this a safer place, as this is a regular topic. Speed, parking and the A43



crossing are on the agenda of the Traffic Working Group, which is held via Zoom and welcomes residents to join and find out first hand what is happening and offer your views. Contact our Clerk on how to attend - scweldonpc@gmail.com

The lack of lights has been raised. Persimmons have now provided lighting along a path to the school gate. On Priors Hall Park walkabout, a resident raised the lack of lights on their street. WPC are looking into this with U&C and NNC Highways.

The next walkabout will be in May and follow the route the judges will take for Weldon in Bloom. Have you checked out the centre and back page to see how you can be part of this rewarding project?



This closure was discussed at the WPC Traffic Working Party and 10 recommendations for change were made, most were accepted and the traffic management plans improved. The diversion route would be the A43 single and dual carriageway bypass roads with access to the landfill site, and other businesses, there via High Street.

For more than two years villagers have been concerned that closing Kettering Road would cause traffic to use Corby Road instead.


Kettering Road duly closed on 4 December. It was clear that the diversion route caused more HGVs to breach the 7.5t restriction.

Over many years WPC has deployed Vehicle Activated Speed (VAS) signs with a data logger on board, the analysis of this data has now been done. Corby Road VAS showed traffic volumes reduced while Kettering Road was closed and increased again when it was reopened. The data collected, to show the analysis, is evident in the graph below.

Residents regularly ask for traffic in Weldon's residential streets to be reduced and slowed. WPC is working with Persimmon Homes, NNC Highways and Tom Pursglove MP, to calm traffic in Weldon Village. We want to get through traffic out of the ancient streets of Weldon Village and onto the A43 where it is best.

During this road closure Church Street was bliss for walkers, cyclists and other vulnerable road users. Along with Kettering Rd, both enjoyed two weeks of calm and we now know that the volume of traffic on Corby Road did not increase, indeed it dropped slightly.

Progress has continued on a number of fronts on what will be our entry to the RHS Britain in Bloom award scheme since the last issue of Weldon Wide.

The number of people involved in the project continues to grow. The working group has finalised the route that the judges will take and work has begun on the brochure that forms part of our entry.

We are growing the majority of our bedding plants from seed and will be planting these out around the time this edition of Weldon Wide is delivered. One of our main planting themes for the summer, particularly near the War Memorial, will be linked to the 80th anniversary of D-Day.

The purpose of the brochure is to showcase areas not visited on judging day and Weldon in bloom throughout the year, not just in July.

Work has also progressed on transforming the Gandy Field from an area of neglect to a community garden. Its correct name is Gander Field, as historically geese were kept in this field. COMMUNITY & PAYBACK INITIATIVE

I'm Graham Stray. As part
of my job as a Parish
Councillor I go on the
monthly on-line video
calls chaired by Stephen
Mold the Fire Police and
Crime Commissioner for

Northampton. It was here that I heard about The Community Pay Back scheme Initiative presented by the East of England Probation Service. A person who has been convicted of a crime that doesn't warrant a prison term pays back with unpaid work within the Community. They are of course supervised at all times.

With some organising, a team of low risk offenders have been carrying out work within the Village for the past couple of months. Weldon Park and Priors Hall Park are not currently included as the developers of those areas are responsible for them until they are adopted by North Northampton Council.

The Village Green railings have been painted and vegetation around the trees have been cleared. This all helps towards the Weldon in Bloom competition. The Cricket Club kindly offers its facilities for the group. As a thank you the Parish Council agreed that their outside benches are painted, the perimeter wire fence along Stamford Road be replaced and new planters built.



It would be remiss of me not to say a massive thank you to my fellow Councillor Colin Shepard, who meets the Pay Back team and agrees the work to be carried out.

The team took on all the tasks we asked them to complete, using just hand tools and working in the rain and cold. An invaluable resource to supporting the continued maintenance of the Village. Win-win for both parties.



Evidence shows that our wild hedgehog population has decreased by as much as 75% over the last few decades.

This decline is due to wild areas and hedgerows being replaced with houses and warehouses. Our neat, tidy gardens with paving and fake grass lawns surrounded by walls and means hedgehogs must travel across busy roads to find food. Increased use of chemicals and pesticides within farming and in our gardens means there are less insects for hedgehogs and their main competitor, the badger, to eat. The list goes on and on.

Gradually people are becoming more aware of the situation and informed to make their environment more hedgehog friendly and what to do when they spot a sick or injured hedgehog.

If you spot a hedgehog out in daylight, it is likely to be seriously ill and therefore an emergency. It is vital to quickly secure it in a sturdy box and contact your local rescue for advice. The good news is hedgehogs have been spotted regularly in Weldon. With the help and support of our local rescue we are helping to maintain a healthy and hopefully increasing population of hedgehogs within the village.



Caroline Lee, who runs Hedgehog Lodge Rescue in Geddington, has nursed several sick hedgehogs from Weldon back to health over the last couple of years. We have several foster carers in our village who work alongside

Caroline to care for recuperating hedgehogs in their own homes until they are big enough and strong enough to be released back to the wild. This is a vital service as it frees up space in the rescue centre making room for more seriously ill hedgehogs.

Running the rescue centre is expensive: buying equipment, vet consultation fees, purchasing medication and food and paying utility bills really adds up.



This is where some of our very talented volunteers within the village come in.

Sue Wildman who tirelessly and generously crochets, sews and knits all types of items that can be sold at fundraising and awareness events locally. Elizabeth McIntosh makes snuggly snoods where hedgehogs sleep whilst in the rescue and people donate essential items either physically or via Caroline's wish list. Thank you to all of you!

HOW TO HELP OUR HEDGEHOGS



Link your gardens Hedgehogs can roam up to 2 miles a night so it is critical that we put 13 x 13cm gaps in all fences.

Make ponds, holes and drains safe Cover up drains and holes and make piles of stones or wood to create a ramp out of ponds.

Create a wild corner Let plants grow to encourage bugs. Add log piles and compost heaps. You may get a hedgehog nest there.

Deal with Netting and Litter Hedgehogs are prone to getting tangled. Plastic cups and elastic bands are common offenders. Replace netting with a rigid structure.

Sports and garden netting should be stored away when not in use.

Put out food and water Hedgehogs really appreciate us supplementing their natural diet. Many kitten biscuits are suitable. Avoid mealworms, peanuts, suet and milk. Always make fresh water available in a shallow dish.

Stop using chemicals Lawn treatments reduce worm population. Pesticides, insecticides and slug pellets are toxic and reduce hedgehogs food source.

Check before strimming and avoid causing horrific injuries and death.

Be careful with bonfires Piles of debris are irresistible to a hedgehog looking to hibernate or nest – build or move on the day of burning to avoid a tragic end.

Hosted by GLP

Some Weldon Parish councillors joined other local parish council members for a second visit to Magna Park.

The meeting was held in the second of the units built on this site. This building is not kitted out for a particular company, compared to the first building that is to be taken on by Tophat. We had an opportunity to ask GLP about the roadworks and effects of traffic. With regard to Tophat the HGV movements would be very low compared to a traditional distribution development. As the development includes office space this will have its own shift patterns.

GLP looks to go beyond just delivering commercial warehousing on their sites and cited the recent example of the Centrica training centre at Magna Park Lutterworth.

GLP explained that an occupier would want to use the buildings for distribution, but there

are proposals to also include staff amenities/a playing pitch facility which connects into the nature trail that runs along the A43 opposite the Holiday Inn. They are still working on having Bee Hives on site.

Discussions with Stagecoach and North Northamptonshire Council (NNC) have started on the bus service to support the staff. WPC has provided GLP with the details of the cycle and pathways discussed in the Local Cycling and Walking Infrastructure Plans (LWCIP) forum. This NNC plan is for 5 new footpaths and 5 new cycle paths in the next 10 years. GLP are happy to work with local communities and improve connections where possible to and from Magna Park.

All invitees were given a tour of the second building with its very large depot and airy office spaces. It was agreed that this is a useful forum for a two-way relationship and to help businesses to tap into local knowledge. WPC welcomes the opportunity to meet with GLP separately to discuss the work being undertaken to discourage routing through Weldon.



The measure of a society is how it treats its most vulnerable members.
